The 2014 Hoosier Traction Meet What is it? When? and Where

On Friday-Saturday, September 5-6 in quiet western Indianapolis, the 31st Hoosier Traction Meet is an annual educational conference recognizing mass transportation, especially electrically powered rail-based systems for urban and regional mobility in the past, present and future. Place-specific presentations typically focus on transit in IL, IN, IA, KY, MI, MN, MO, western NY, OH, ON, PA, WV or WI. Discussion of technologies or trends may draw examples from anywhere in North America or beyond.

What is the format? The Meet includes two aspects:

① Anyone can visit the **exhibition** for *free* Friday 12 NOON-10 PM and Saturday 8 AM-4 PM EDT. Exhibitors offer items illustrating the principles and nature of mass transportation systems: photos, books, miniature models, timetables and other collectibles.

2 The hotel's 150-seat theatre-style auditorium hosts 10 different audio-visual presentations, some repeated to increase capacity (see the opposite panel). Speakers provide live narration along with photos or maps. Media and format may vary.

What is the cost for the auditorium sessions? You can purchase a ticket onsite for \$40 (cash, check or money order) valid for your admission to any or all auditorium presentations (subject to the theatre occupancy limit). You can select which sessions to attend and when to take meal breaks. The same privileges now are half price by mail. Please make check or money order for \$19.50 payable to Hoosier Traction Meet, Inc. and mail in ample time to Roy G. Benedict, 3511 N. Pittsburgh Ave., Chicago IL 60634-2837.

What are the accommodations? Again our location is the *Clarion Hotel*, a no-smoking convention center at 2930 Waterfront Parkway West Dr., Indianapolis IN 46214. The Clarion offers rooms, if you guarantee your reservation with a major credit card or prepay by **August 10**, at a special rate (single or double) of \$72 per night plus tax. Call (317) 299-8400, 8 AM-5 PM EDT weekdays, ask for Group Sales, and mention the *Hoosier Traction Meet*.

Driving directions: From the west leg of I-465, the expressway belt around Indianapolis, take Exit 16A. At the first traffic signal go *west* onto U. S. 136, then drive 0.4 miles to the *second* Waterfront Parkway and turn right. The Clarion is in sight across the fields.

2014 auditorium sessions and speakers

Friday–Saturday, September 5–6

- Adjustments are possible. An updated Schedule of Events will be distributed at the greeters' table.
- You can personalize your meal breaks by skipping a "prepeat," a "repeat," or another session.
- Sessions typically last 1 to 1½ hours. "Stretch your legs" breaks (about 30 minutes) between most sessions.
- Last scheduled session ends about 10:30 PM Friday, 10 PM Saturday.

EASTERN DAYLIGHT TIME

Fr 9:30 AM only: Chicago south suburban transit. "Million Mile" operator John LeBeau tells us how the mass transportation needs of this large region have been met over the decades to the present.

Fr 11:30 AM prepeat, Fr 3:30 PM repeat: Buckeye State samplings. Ken Schramm and Richard Andrews provide a look at various streetcar and other electric railway operations throughout Ohio.

Fr 1:30 PM prepeat, Fr 5:30 PM repeat: Sesquicentennal of Indianapolis transit. David MILLER commemorates local transportation in the Meet's hometown, where track construction began 150 years ago.

Fr 7:30 PM only: Current transit industry news, pt. 1 \ Two different Fr 9:30 PM only: Current transit industry news, pt. 2 \ \ \text{sessions narrated by Charles Bogart, author of histories of streetcar systems in numerous Kentucky localities.}

Sa 8:30 AM only: Cleveland via Erie to Buffalo by trolley. Author Ken Springirth shows how you once could travel by interurban trolley routes along half the length of the Lake Erie shore—plus a side trip from Westfield (N. Y.) to Sheffield (Pa.). His 21 books include both railroad and trolley subjects.

Sa10:30 AM prepeat, Sa 4:30 PM repeat: Chicago's North Side 'L'. BRUCE G. MOFFAT recounts its development, beginning with Charles Yerkes' battle with the city to extend rapid transit into the north side, followed by upgrading a steam railroad to extend 'L' trains into the suburbs. Also covered: Joint operations with steam-powered freights, electric interurbans, and the 'L's own electric freight.

Sa12:30 pm prepeat, Sa 6:30 pm repeat: Minneapolis-St. Paul streetcars.

Aaron Isaacs, an author of *Twin Cities by Trolley*, tells us about past local transit in the Minnesota conurbation.

Sa 2:30 PM only: A railfan's tour of the last three streetcar lines in Indianapolis. Marty Biemer and Ken Houser present still photos depicting the final months of streetcar operation in the Hoosier State. Born, living and attending school along streetcar streets in Indianapolis, Ken began railroad and streetcar photography in 1943.

Sa 8:30 PM only: A ride on the Lake Shore Electric. EARL W. CLARK escorts us along the other half the length of Lake Erie—from Cleveland to Toledo—aboard one of the last classic interurban railways.

Travel to the Meet (see the accompanying maps)

Indianapolis is accessible by Interstate highways 65 69 70 74 and by $\frac{1}{1}$ air. 🔈 Amtrak, 🖳 Greyhound and 🖳 Hoosier Ride all reach the downtown Indianapolis Amtrak station. Taxis from there include Indianapolis Yellow Cab, (317) 487-7777. Distance to the Meet is under 9 miles.

■ Megabus delivers passengers to a downtown stop for ■ IndyGo city bus 8 going west to Indianapolis International Airport every 30 minutes in daytime. Going directly to the airport are 🚔 Star of America from Bloomington, Ind., \rightleftharpoons *Hoosier Shuttle* from Fort Wayne, and \rightleftharpoons *Lafayette Limo*.

Major car rental agencies have airport locations. We are 12 miles from the airport via I-70 east and I-465 north. Or, if you have reserved a room at the Clarion, a hotel shuttle is available until Sunday noon, except 6 AM-8 AM each day. Call (317) 299-8400 for pickup at the airport. Arrange at the hotel front desk for delivery to the airport.

Dining near the Meet

Join your friends or make new friends and sample restaurants appealing to a variety of palates and wallets within a few miles.

Who operates the Meet?


Hoosier Traction Meet, Inc. is an Indiana nonprofit public benefit corporation. Its directors are Roy G. Benedict, Charles H. Bogart, James H. Graebner and George M. Smerk. William M. Shapotkin arranges the auditorium sessions. Richard K. Baldwin arranges for the venue and manages the exhibit space.

The Meet was founded in 1984 by Howard R. Blackburn, a radiologist. To ensure its perpetuation "Doc," George K. Bradley and Larry R. Zimmerman incorporated it in 1996. It has been determined by the Internal Revenue Service to be a 501(c)(3) educational organization.

What is "traction"?

This historical term for rail transit was used both generically and in the corporate title of numerous cities' street railways. In the Meet's name it honors an industry which now has served mankind for over 180 years.

A greeter will be present or "on call" 8 AM-10 PM Friday and Saturday. A RED AND YELLOW sign on the table will tell how to contact him if he is not in sight.

If you have registered by mail by August 30, your admission credentials will be ready for you by 8:30 AM Friday or 8 AM Saturday. We'll also have printed pages with: (1) a full-page map identifying individual restaurants, stores and banks near the Meet, plus a few other central Indiana attractions "not so near," and (2) the Meet's most recent Schedule of Events.

An Indianapolis transportation anniversary

This year marks 150 years of transit in Indianapolis. Construction of streetcar track started September 5, 1864 near Union Station. Cars began running in the evening of October 3. The route extended 9 blocks along Illinois, Washington and West streets. The company owned 10 cars and 25 mules.
